# *Earning High School Credits*

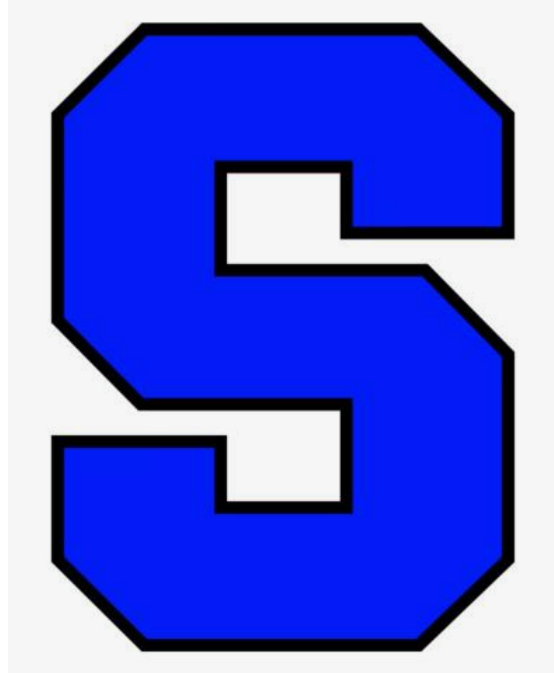
Scotland High School requires a *minimum* 28 credits to graduate:

To earn credits toward graduation, students must

- 1) Earn a grade of 60 or higher
- 2) Have *no more than* 8 absences per semester

Why?

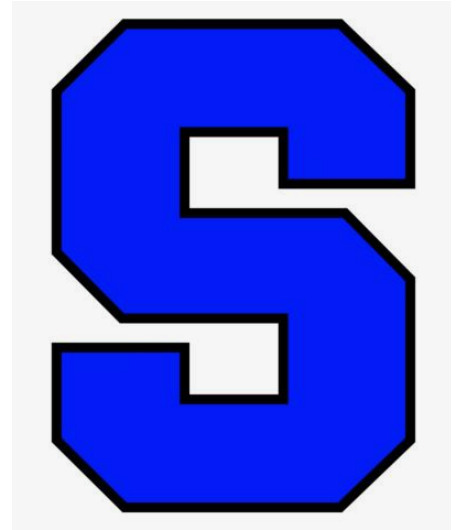
Scotland High School works to prepare students for **Employment**, **Enlistment** or **Enrollment** at a university. Students must demonstrate DEPENDABILITY (from attendance) and WORK ETHIC (from grades).

# Foreign Language

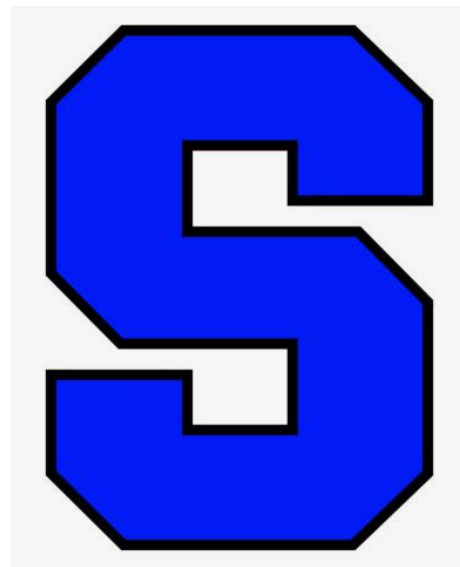
Students attending 4-year universities are required to earn 2 credits in the same foreign language.

SHS offers two different foreign languages on campus:

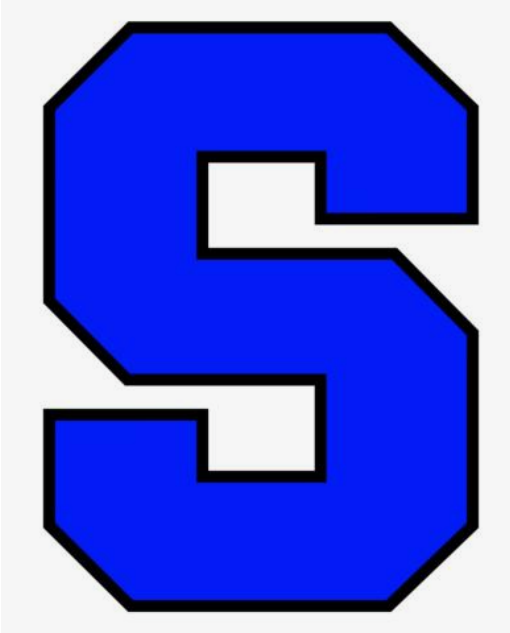
- Spanish

# Fine Arts



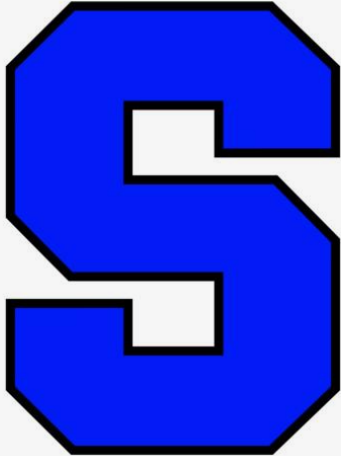
SHS offers several opportunities in the Fine Arts for students to explore their creative side:

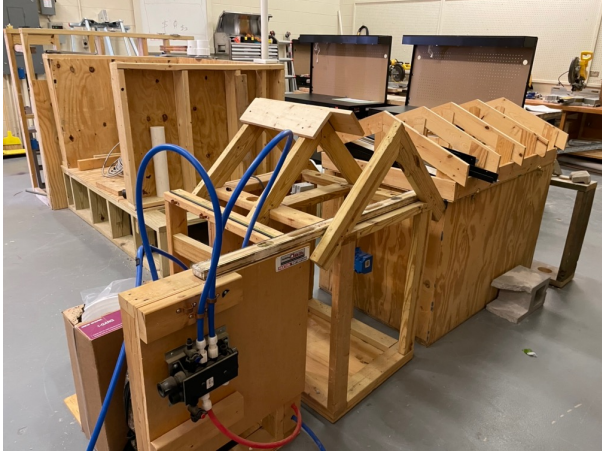

# SCOTLAND HIGH SCHOOL'S JROTC PROGRAM

# WHAT IS JROTC?

The Junior Reserves' Officer Training Corps is a military-based program which is embedded in Middle & High School curriculums. JROTC is an active force for change in the Education System.



# JROTC HISTORY

- JROTC at Scotland High was started on May 20 1985.
- The JROTC Program was established in the National Defense Act of 1916. In '46 Congress expanded the program to all military branches.



# JROTC SKILLS

JROTC is a proactive program, and encourages cadets to use their abilities to better their personal character. JROTC takes advantage of your personal interests and responsibilities and uses them to increase the likeliness you will be productive in fields you are interested in. Working hard to achieve your goals is an essential part of the ROTC experience.



# ACTIVITIES

The JROTC Program not just a classroom experience, but most elements of the experience include hands-on activities. Exercise, Games, Field Trips, Drill, and Design are all essential components in the Scotland JROTC Program. There is never a boring moment in the ROTC Classroom, or even during ROTC Events.



We have several teams for different activities, including our Drill Team, Rifle Team, Robotics, and even Academic Bowls.

# RIFLE TEAM

Rifle teams promote marksmanship in cadets, and encourage them to pursue friendly competition in those abilities. Rifle Matches are often held on the Regional, State, or National level. The Scotland Battalion has participated in each of these types of competitions.







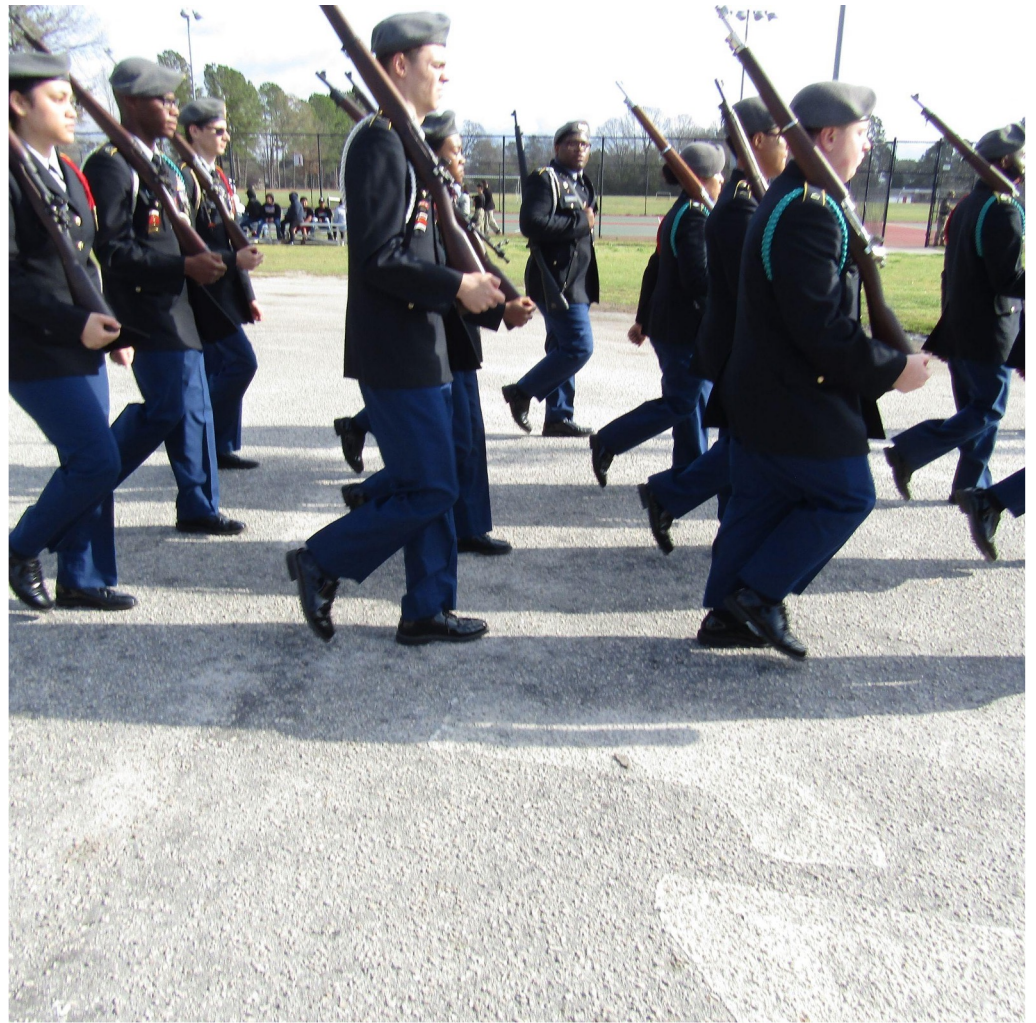
# DRILL TEAM

The JROTC Program believes that Drill is the backbone of discipline.

Personal discipline as well as cooperative responsibility play key parts in Drill. Drill is more than marching, it's a representation of how professional your unit is. Many

JROTC awards and medals are based on drill performance. Drill is the most important JROTC activity.







# COLOR GUARD & PARADES

The Scotland Colour Guard is an elite drill team which focuses on 'Trooping the Colors'. They carry our State, National, and County flags before the drill team during competitions, parades, etc. The Color Guard is an essential part of parades, and leads the ROTC in parades.







# FIELD TRIPS

Because JROTC is a proactive program, and we seek to educate our cadets through hands-on experiences, ROTC Cadets often go on program-sponsored field trips. Those trips can be beneficial for obtaining college information, community service, or even general encouragement for cadets to give them a break from the stressful school environment.







# FIELD DAY

The JROTC Program offers incentives for good behavior and academic progress. If cadets have shown that they have worked hard during the semester, the program will work to ease their load towards the end of the year. One example of this is a program-sponsored Field Day.





# BENEFITS

Enrolling in the ROTC Program can benefit you long-term, even if you don't want to enlist in the United States Military. JROTC can offer college grants, scholarships, and your progress will look good on college applications.



JROTC is not intended to incentivize enlisting, the purpose of the program is to increase students' graduation rates.

# AFTER HIGH SCHOOL

- If you choose to enlist and have displayed effort in ROTC in all four years of High School, you will be promoted to an E-3 upon your enlistment in any branch of the Military. An E-3 is a Corporal or Specialist.
- Scholarships can be awarded by the Army Junior Officer Reserves' Training Corps (JROTC) based upon merit and accomplishment, not on financial need. Cadets in leadership roles, such as the Staff, are more likely to receive scholarships and when they do their scholarships are bigger.

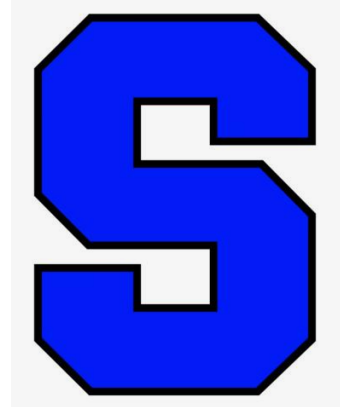

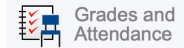

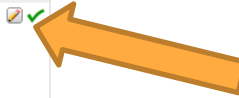

# The next steps...

Students indicating interest in college classes through RCC will be called to meet with RCC counselors over the next two weeks. The enrollment process must be completed before students can be placed in those classes.

Once the Master Schedule is built, students will receive their schedules in the mail during the first week of August. Dates will be scheduled after that to meet with counselors about any changes. There are only **three** reasons a schedule can be changed:

- If another class is needed for graduation
- If the prerequisite course was not earned
- If the student wishes to go **up** in Academic level (ie, Standard to Honors, etc.)
